

HOW TO SEND A TITLE IX COMPLAINT TO THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION AND U.S. DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE



If you are concerned that your school is not responding appropriately to reports of sexual harassment, including sexual assault, the U.S. Departments of Education and Justice want to hear from you.

Sending in a complaint is easy: Just tell us what happened.

You do not need an attorney to send a complaint to the federal government. There are no costs, fees, or charges when you send us a complaint. And you do not need to include any law or reference any legal standards.
